

With chart-topping summer jams and increasingly challenging acting roles, the former Kickin' It star's cureer has been kicked into high year.

Olivia Halt's music may be all you need for your 2017 summer playies, from the run-bleached pop track Paradise', a collaboration with Denmark based rapper Brandon Boal; to the relessions beat of MYRADD's Farty on a Weekday', which features her flavelenr crooning to her hit singles: the Calypso tinged 'History', and the unabashedly feel good anthem 'Phoenia' - serimosly, try not to feel motivated after listening to that one; it's impossible. (As for her summer ploylist! She currently has Brune Mars and Harry Styles in Leavey rotation.)

Helt's brazel of pop is genuine. On the slower 'History' -- a true story about when she was still crazy about her sx and couldn't give full attention to her new beau-she gets to play with youl number, and underneath the pitch-perfect melody is an edge; you can hear her authenticity trickle through. "I've always told repealf I never want to be a part. of a project or a song that doesn't resonate with me is any way. Whether a song is sent to me or I write it, it has to come from the heart, because I feel like people can just see right through that."

Being transparent and connecting with fans is high on Holt's List of priorities. She calls us from Columbia, South Carolina, during week five of her world radio tour, where she's been performing accustic versions of 'History' and charting with fame in cities like Denmark, Norway, Berlin, and all arrows the US.

"Everyone has been really responding to the song, which makes me really happy. I have a chance to talk with [fana], which is nice because I do it over social media all the time. so to use some of them face to face and have a real life conversation with them is really special. I'm crasy about them," she saps. "I met this really, really lovely girl who has been a massive fan since the beginning of Ricker It just a couple months ago. And what's even cooler, we've been Twitter friends since then, too. Meeting her in person for the first time in 6 years was so special."

Holt has been spending a lot of time in the studio lately, writing and recording in hopes of putting out a follow-up to her 2016 Offsia EP, which she says is about messing up, learning, and shaping yourself into who you want to be. "It's a whole experimental process right now, really figuring out where I want to go lyrically, and where I want to take my sound," she tells us. "I want the lyrics to be authentic to me, and [for] the mast: [to] fulfill every element of pop, soul, and alternative, and to hear real organic instruments and tone." But the new music won't differ too dractically from her current sound. These my first EP so much and feel so proud of it is because it's me. Every bric is an experience of mine and an expression of who I am. I want to continue making music like that," she says.

When it comes to the creative direction of her videos, Holt in just as hands-on. "There've been a few videos in the past that I've done where I had no involvement at all and want't stoked with the end result, and I never want that to happen again. I want to have manrive say in what goes down in mach music video that I'm a part of."

Growing up in Mississippi where she attended theater camp at a young age, eventually landing commencial spots at age 13, Holt says she's always been an extrovert, and it's clear she was born to be a performer. "I was so young and just so in love with the idea of entertaining and moving people with my performance. And every time I walked out on stage loved it," she remembers. But songwriting is a passion. she's newly discovering.

"When I was younger I never considered myself a songwriter. I always considered reyself just a singer, but being in recens with all these writers and producers and bouncing ideas off of each other, and frecounting real life superiences that I've had and putting them into a song is a really ashilarating feeling. Every time I walk into the studio and we write something, whether it's something I'm going to put out or not. I feel really confident and proud of it, and it's worth it. It's fun and it's overwhelming and scary;

you're kind of speaking from your heart and your esperiersors, which sometimes [I] feel a little timid sharing, but I'm really enjoying it."

If for some reason you haven't already, you're about to see Helt's face everywhere (though with 'History' and Thomas' at 8 million combined views on YouTube, we're pretty sure you have). She's the new face of Neutrogena (literally). and is making a name for henself in the lashion world with a line of sunnies she secently designed with Perverse. Each of the three designs represents one of the women in her family: herself, her mom, Kimberly, and her sister, Morgan-the latter two, she says, are the most important women in her life.

I designed each one to our personalities and style. The Kimberly is a cool, trendy, retro vibe, with rose gold lenses. The Morgan is this edgy, spenky, factor look. And the Liv is this translacent, simple, this style."

Holt also has two upcoming films, and will star as Tandy in the first live action iteration of Marvel's Class & Dugger series, which comes out in 2018, Having an athletic background, she performs her own stunts in the drama/action. series (her character also shoots light daggers out of her hands, so we're pretty sattled to see that next year).

Her sportring film Status Undate, where she stars opposite her friend, RS's Ross Lynch (they both worked on sitcoms growing up whose sound stages were right next to each other), is a coming of age film (think: Fig & 23 Going on 30) written by Jason Filandi, the writer of 17 Agein. In R. Lynch. plays Ride Moore, a tomager whose family is being torn apart. Ryle moves to a new town and soon discovers that he can alter the future with his status opdates on social media. "Then all hell breaks loose," says Helt of the film. The anamusing story. I was really happy when I get the opporturnity to work on a fun project [with Lynch]. He's very intelligent and has an insane work other. I'm very grateful to know him and to have worked with him."

Holt also stars in the Bric Steltz's apcorning indie fick Class Renk, alongoide Kristin Chenoweth and Bruce Dem. Her character, Verentca, "only carer about becoming America's next supreme court justice, net about becoming America's Next Top Model," she says.

Research for the role also got Holt into politics, giving her an entirely new perspective and interest in world affairs, but it also gave her the opportunity to think critically about embodying a character, from the books she read in preparation for the role, down to the dother she wore on set. "I remember when we were in wardrobe they gave me a sine too big its isons, I was like, 'actually this is perfect.' I feel like [Veronica] wouldn't wear tight fitting jeans that show her figure, she'd wear jeans that are kind of buggy, and penny loaders to make her walk less confident."

Status Update and Class Rusk represent a shift in Holt's acting career, which was jump-started when she played Kim Crawford on Disney XD's Kickis' Jt. 'I think it was a good transition for me, being able to work on a pitcom overy single day for six years, and having that high energy, and [then] going to an inda film where the energy is more relaxed and I'm playing a completely different character. It was a good challengs for me. I feel like that just shapes me into a better human and helps me evolve as an actor.

Holt's roles in these coming of age films parallel her life. off-screen. A quick sum of the YouTube currenents on her single Phoenia' (which, by the way, are full of adoration) stelds fan comments about how much Holt has changed. since the Distrey series. Like Distrey stars turned singer/ songwriters before her, she faces the challenging role of growing up in the public eye, but seems to be he doing so effortlessly, and luckily, not alone.

The great thing about having fans watching the grow up is that we all get to grow up together," she tells us. "Some of the things that I'm going through in my life, they may be going through too. And it's a lot less challenging to write music that way. knowing I'm not the only one; everyone is going through something.
